Make Visible

■ What's Out There®

A searchable database, freely available to the public, of more than 2,000 site essays, 1,100 designer profiles, and 12,000 images, all linked to an array of related content.

■ City Guides / Guidebooks

Thoroughly researched and richly illustrated guides to the landscape legacies of major U.S. cities, both online (city guides) and in print (guidebooks).

■ Pioneers Oral Histories

A video series documenting the lives and careers of significant landscape architects, with never-before-seen archival footage, new photography, and on-location videography.

■ Pioneers Volumes I-III

Two extensive, scholarly collections (with a third now in press) of biographical essays documenting the lives and careers of important practitioners.

The Cultural Landscape Foundation (TCLF)

TCLF is a 501(c)(3) non-profit founded in 1998 to connect people to places. TCLF educates and engages the public to make our shared landscape heritage more visible, identify its value, and empower its stewards. Instill Value

■ What's Out There® Weekends

Free, expert-led tours of parks, gardens, and other cultural landscapes in cities across the nation.

■ Garden Dialogues

Intimate tours of exemplary gardens (most often, private gardens) with their patrons and designers, revealing the creative and collaborative process behind each landscape.

■ Conferences / Symposia

Curated meetings of thought-leaders that explore the landscape legacies and future planning of cities and regions, with panels and audiences comprising public officials, decision-makers, practitioners, and others.

■ Exhibitions

Traveling photographic exhibitions about cultural landscapes that are hosted by museums, universities, and other cultural institutions across the United States.

Empower Stewards

■ The Landslide Program

An ongoing **advocacy campaign** that calls attention to significant cultural landscapes across the nation that are threatened by neglect or demolition.

Helps local stewards mobilize and amplify public support at state and national levels through education and strategic communications campaigns.

Monitors and updates at-risk landscapes until they are declared "saved" or "lost."

■ Annual Landslide Online

High-profile, thematic reports on a select number of threatened landscapes, accompanied by richly illustrated and comprehensive photographic exhibitions and print publications.

■ Technical Assistance

Direct consultation with communities, municipalities, and other groups in need of the critical context necessary for making decisions about urban planning, park design, and stewardship.
